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WHY RURAL MATERNAL HEALTH NEEDS DEDICATED SUPPORT

Rural communities face persistent challenges in maternal healthcare due to limited access to obstetric services, workforce shortages, and geographic barriers that delay timely care. In rural settings, pregnant and postpartum patients often receive care across multiple environments, including emergency departments, outpatient clinics, and inpatient units, sometimes without on-site obstetric expertise.

These realities contribute to higher rates of maternal mortality and severe maternal morbidity and require approaches to maternal safety and quality that reflect rural care delivery.

The Maternal Quality and Safety Toolkit for Rural Hospitals provides practical, adaptable resources to support perinatal safety across care settings. The [Colorado Perinatal Care Quality Collaborative \(CPCQC\)](#) recommends the [Alliance for Innovation on Maternal Health \(AIM\)](#) patient safety bundles as condition-specific resources and provides this toolkit, designed to be flexible, relevant to multiple initiatives, and grounded in the realities of rural practice.

Patients can carry this wallet card with them throughout pregnancy, delivery, and up to one year postpartum.

One-pager resource with patient hotlines, maternal warning signs materials, and screening tools. The tools are for use with patients in outpatient and inpatient settings for prenatal, intrapartum, and postpartum care and focus on screening for mental health, Substance Use Disorder, and social determinants of health. This resource is ideal for printing for your staff work stations.

PATIENT & PROVIDER QUICK REFERENCE MATERIALS

PREGNANCY & POSTPARTUM QUICK CARE CARD

This wallet card is designed to promote continuity of care for patients by keeping essential health details and key contact information readily accessible. Small and portable, it can travel with patients across care settings throughout pregnancy, delivery, and the full first year postpartum.

Pregnancy and the year following birth are times of increased vulnerability to medical complications, mental health conditions, substance use challenges, and interpersonal violence. By clearly identifying someone as pregnant or postpartum, and outlining important warning signs, the card helps non-obstetric providers recognize risk, respond promptly, and connect patients to appropriate treatment and support.

Pregnancy & Postpartum Quick Care Card cpcqc

Keep this card with your ID or insurance card. If you need medical care during pregnancy or in the first year after having your baby, please show this card to your doctor, midwife, nurse, or paramedic.

Having a baby can increase risks for medical issues, mental health concerns, substance use, and domestic violence. If something feels off, [trust yourself and get help](#).

BACK

Immediately call 911 or go to the Emergency Room for ANY of these issues:

- Chest pain or difficulty breathing
- Feeling extremely sleepy, weak, or passing out
- Seizures
- Blood pressure higher than 160/110
- Thoughts of harming yourself or your baby
- Fear for your safety or your baby's safety

Call or visit your doctor or midwife for these medical concerns:

- Blood pressure higher than 140/90
- Blurred vision or headache that does not get better with meds, fluids, or rest
- Fever higher than 100.4 degrees
- Redness, swelling, heat, discharge, or bad smell in your stitches or breasts
- Bleeding that fills a pad in less than 1 hour or clots larger than an egg
- Swelling, tenderness, redness, or heat in your legs
- New or uncontrolled pain
- Having trouble pooping or pain when peeing

Call your doctor, midwife, or therapist/counselor for these mental health concerns:

- Feeling sad, worried, angry, anxious, or guilty. Especially if it makes it hard to sleep, take care of yourself, or your baby
- Using or considering using substances (vaping/cigarettes, marijuana, alcohol, opioids, or other) to cope
